Attendance



Behaviour Policy



St. Andrew's CofE Primary School Traffic Light Behaviour System

The staff and children of St. Andrew's Coff Primary School have a **right** to work, learn and play in a safe and happy environment, without fear, intimidation, disruption and discrimination. All staff and children have a **responsibility** to act in a manner which allows other to do this. Therefore the following Traffic Light System will be used to support and promote good <u>behaviour</u>.



Well done, you are working well and keeping on task!

If you are not making the right choices, then an adult will give you a verbal warning and remind you of the school rules. They may also;

 Ask you to move to a different seat
Remind you of your choices and consequences

If you continue to not make the right choice then you will be given an amber card and will be sent to another class to complete your work. When you return to class, you will stay on the amber card to remind you to work carefully and continue to try your best.

If your behaviour does not improve after the amber warning, then you will be given a red card. This will mean a 15 minute Time Out with SLT to fill out a restorative justice sheet, an entry in the behaviour log and a phone call home. Certain specific behaviours will result in a red card straight away. These include deliberate violence, racist or verbal abuse, use of swear words, walking away from an adult or refusing to go on time out.

Children who achieve 95% or more green cards (and no red cards) over the course of the week will attend Golden Time on Friday afternoon between 2:45 and 3:05pm.

Autumn Term Planning

Here is a summary of what the children are going to be learning this term:

English:

<u>Texts:</u> Viking Boy by Tony Bradman; Non fiction text about Vikings Reading:

In depth reading of Viking Boy through the use of prediction, explanation, retrieval, summarising and exploring vocabulary and inference. Using evidence in text to support understanding and draw out key information. Writing:

Adventure writing based on class text. Experimenting with sentence structure and language features including understanding and using adverbials, relative clauses and dialogue. Understand and use features of Newspaper reports.

RE:

How do Muslims live and embrace their faith in a diverse world? Know about the significance and importance of the Shahadah to a Muslim's life; know about the importance of Zakat for Muslims and the impact it has on an individual's way of thinking; know that how a Muslim expresses and embraces their faith will be different for each individual; find out about how there is diversity within Islam.

Computing:

<u>Communication and collaboration</u> Knowhow data is transferred over the internet; evaluate different methods of communication; know how to communicate responsibly online.

Art/DT: Viking Longships

Knowhow to use line to create texture; design a Viking Longship and explore a variety of materials to make a 3D model; experiment with joining materials; use decoupage to add texture to final product.

French:

Greetings, Birthdays, Numbers

Maths

<u>Number: Place Value</u>- Read, write, order and compare numbers up to 10,000,000 and determine the value of each digit; round any whole number to a required degree of accuracy; use negative numbers in context, and calculate intervals across zero.

<u>Number: Addition, subtraction, multiplication and division</u>- Solve addition and subtraction multi-step problems in contexts; multiply multi -digit numbers up to 4 digits by a 2-digit number using the formal written method of long multiplication; divide numbers up to 4 digits by a 2-digit whole number using the formal written method of long division, and interpret remainders as whole number remainders, fractions, or by rounding as appropriate for the context.

Science:

Living things and their habitats

Explore the conditions for life and know the difference between living and non-living things; know how to label different organisms and group them based on their characteristics; know how to classify animals and plants; know what microorganisms are and describe and classify them; know about the work of Carl Linnaeus and his system of classifying organisms.

Geography/History: Rule Britannia

Know and remember where the Vikings came from and explore why they came to Britain; use maps and atlases to locate countries and identify their physical features; make links between the Vikings, Anglo Saxons and Roman times in Britain and compare these using timelines; know and remember the events of the Viking attack at Lindisfame and use evidence to identify different perspectives and the significance of religion on the lives on the people.

PE: Thursday: Cognitive Skills Friday: Basketball

Music:

Music and Technology Developing ensemble skills

PSHE:

<u>VIPs Relationships</u>- identify important people within their different groups; address conflicts and resolutions in relationships.

Reading

All children are expected to read <u>at</u> <u>least</u> 5 times a week. Reading at home is English Homework.

Children have a reading book based on phonics or reading assessments. They will bring home 1 or 2 books at a time and they can change these in school when needed.

Lunches and Healthy Eating

- All children should only have fruit and vegetables for their playtime snack.
- Packed lunches should be as healthy and balanced as possible, with only 1 treat per day such as crisps or a sweet item.
- We are a nut free school!
- KS2 children are entitled to free meals for a year. Please order in advance via Colham Catering

- To support with providing all children with a healthy breakfast
- All classes will have trays of bagels available during soft start
- Allergen information on classroom windows - please confirm if your child cannot have these
- Bagels will also be available at Breakfast Club alongside existing menu

Home Learning

Our main home learning activities will be;

We expect all children to complete their homework to a high standard at all times.

If children are unable to access electronic devices at home then they will be supported within school time to complete their online learning.

Pupil Premium

The school receives an additional <u>£1455</u> per eligible pupil to support their education. This could be towards support in class or with some after school club activities, trips or uniform, or Breakfast Club.

Are you eligible?

A child may be eligible for free school meals (FSM) if their parents receive any of the following benefits:

Income Support Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (JSA) Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit Child Tax Credit, provided the parents are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190 Working Tax Credit run-on, which is paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax credit Universal Credit - for those applying on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they get). See the section below for protections in place for those affected by the introduction of this income threshold

Children may also get FSM if they receive any of these benefits directly, instead of through a parent.

Clothing and PE

PE days are (indoor) and (outdoor). Please make sure you have the correct kit, <u>labeled</u> and in school all week..

Earrings <u>must</u> be removed for PE, and long hair tied back.

Children will only be excused from PE sessions if they have a note (or a Dojo message) from the parents.

Care Fund

St Andrew's C of E Primary, as a faith school, is a Voluntary Aided School.

This means that we are not fully funded by the Government in the same way as other schools.

- hen any repairs need to be made to the school or grounds, the Governing Body are required to pay the total cost if it is under £2,000, or 10% of the costs if over this amount.
- This 10% is covered by a scheme run by the London Diocesan Board for Schools. St Andrew's contributes to this scheme on an annual basis through the Governors' Fund.
- In order to fund these contributions, we rely on additional funding from parents making regular, voluntary payments, into the Care Fund.
